# **NEHEMIAH: More than walls**

# **NEHEMIAH:**

## More than walls

When you hear the name Nehemiah—what comes to mind?

Often we think about walls, as it was under his vision and leadership that the ruined walls of the city of Jerusalem where rebuilt. However, as we study the book of Nehemiah in Engage: Small Groups this spring we will see that the book is about much more than walls. Themes of leadership and teamwork, prayer and vision, action and opposition, strategy and sovereignty are all weaved into the story of this book.

## **SETTING THE SCENE:**

Nehemiah is found in the Old Testament, immediately following the book of Ezra. In the Hebrew Bible these two books are considered one. Together they tell the story of God's people around 440 years before Jesus came to earth. At that time, God's people where in exile. They had been taken from their land, because they had not followed God's ways. The book of Ezra, narrates the story of the first people to return to the land of Israel, Ezra 1:1 tells us two reasons why they returned - because the King of Persia sent them back, and because God said they would come back. God is in control!

Under the leadership of Ezra, some people return and rebuild the temple. Worship of God again takes place in Jerusalem, but as we move into Nehemiah we discover the return is far from complete. A report reaches Nehemiah which says.

"Those who survived the exile and are back in the province are in great trouble and disgrace. The wall of Jerusalem is broken down, and its gates have been burned with fire."

Nehemiah 1:3

Nehemiah is moved by what he hears, and responds with prayer, action, vision and leadership. As he does so—he rebuilds the walls and the community of God's people in Jerusalem and the land of Israel.

#### STRUCTURE:

The book splits into two parts:

PART 1: Chapters 1:1-7:3

Nehemiah returns to Jerusalem and the walls are rebuilt.

PART 2: Chapters 7:4-13:31

The exiles return and community is rebuilt.

#### THEMES:

GOD IS SOVEREIGN: He rules over all the earth. He cares for his people. As God is sovereign, Nehemiah prays.

GOD USES PEOPLE: Nehemiah, a godly leader, who has vision and wisdom. But it's not just Nehemiah—God uses everyone—each one plays their part under Nehemiah's leadership.

GOD USES HIS WORD: As the people hear and respond to God's word, community is rebuilt.

GOD'S WORK KEEPS ON GOING: In two senses— in the face of opposition; and there is always more to do.

### **RELEVANCE:**

The four themes above are deeply relevant to our lives as individuals and together as God's church, in Chryston and Moodiesburn today.

Whilst there are many patterns and principals we can pick up from Nehemiah, we must do so knowing that he was not perfect. And the work he did, was not the final goal. As a leader, Nehemiah points us to the one true leader Jesus Christ. And all Nehemiah's work, prepares the way for Jesus to come.

So as you study Nehemiah, don't seek to be like him, rather look to Jesus, seek his strength, so God can use you, as he used Nehemiah.
